I am delighted to welcome Stuart Deakin to the Parish Council. We always seem to have a vacancy for one parish councillor but recently the departure of one of the members meant that we were two down. Stuart has kindly stepped forward so we are now back to a single vacancy.

The Joint Core Strategy (JCS) has to be our other headline event this month. The independent planning inquiry is moving towards a conclusion. Although the inquiry may not conclude for months it is becoming possible to get some sense of what the likely outcome will be and I believe that an interim conclusion can be expected in May. As ever, the result is likely to be short of what we hoped for but better than we feared it might be. There can be little doubt that many houses are going to be built on the land between Swindon Parish and Elmstone Hardwicke. It is more a question of how many and whether we can defend enough green space to retain the context of the village. To this end former Councillor Arran Stibbe and Councillor Helen Wells have been working very actively on our behalf on both fronts. Hopefully I will be able to bring you more definite news in the next issue.

It is a feature of Local Government that there are officers and members. Members are the councillors elected to office by the electorate or co-opted onto the council if there are insufficient candidates to trigger an election. Officers on the other hand are employees of the council. This applies not just to the County and Borough Councils but also to Parish Councils, the lowest tier of Local Government. We have eight parish councillors (with a vacancy for one more). Our councillors face re-election every four years (if sufficient candidates stand). For our parish the next election will be in 2018.

For those who love a chance to cast a vote there are opportunities this year (aside from the Brexit question). We have two Borough Councillors representing our ward. The ward, by the way, includes all of Swindon Parish but also part of Prestbury Parish. Our two Borough Councillors come up for election in different years, so we have an election for one of the Borough Councillors on 5th May.

I have side tracked myself into talking about elections when I meant to discuss members and officers. I am turning into a (slightly) taller version of Ronnie Corbett.

It is important to understand the distinction between members (councillors) and officers because councillors are essentially volunteers and they are the ones with the responsibility for determining council policy. With something like the JCS the developers have teams of planners, architects and lawyers working full time and generating thousands of pages of documents. Sometimes the volume of documentation does more to hide what is going on than to illuminate it! Councillors

have to wrestle with this material whilst, in many cases, holding down a day job. That was the point I was labouring towards. To round off the picture, as Clerk to the Parish Council I am an officer (and the only employee of the Council). Mine is a job like any other (actually like no other!) so I can be fired rather than fail to get re-elected.

One last election to mention is that of the Police and Crime Commissioner, also taking place on 5th May. Whichever way you feel inclined to cast your vote in these upcoming polls please do have your say. These are important decisions.

If the above discussion hasn't confused you enough I now move on to the matter of annual meetings. The Annual Meeting of the Parish Council will take place on the 10th May in the Village Hall bar area. This meeting elects the Parish Council chairman for 2016-2017. The public are welcome to attend but it is a Parish Council meeting so, apart from the public session, the public attend as observers rather than participants. The following evening (also in the Village Hall) we have the Annual Parish Meeting. This is a meeting aimed entirely at our parishioners. Feel free to come along to ask questions, raise issues or complain about my articles in the Village News. Both meetings start at 7:30pm.

A local planning application which may be of interest concerns the corner where Swindon Road joins Kingsditch Lane (at the mini roundabouts). An application has been made to develop the land that is currently a car park serving Topps Tiles and the gym. The application is very generic in that a number of different types of business could utilise the development. The Parish Council has objected to the plans for several reasons. The site provides an important pedestrian link and the plans do not make any provision to replace it. Nor do the plans appear to include any provision for the management of waste that would be generated on the site. Also one of the use classes applied for would allow the use of part of the site as a car showroom. The Parish Council feels this site is unsuited to that type of business and also fears that car parking (including facilities for the disabled) will be inadequate.

Our Area Highways Manager is moving on within Gloucestershire County Council. What was always a very difficult job has probably been made impossible by budget cuts and roads deteriorating due to poor weather. It will be interesting to see how his successor fares and what his priorities are.

The annual accounts for the Parish Council were approved at the April meeting. They are available to the public on our web site if you are interested. I am happy to answer any questions.

I was recently reading the minutes of another parish council (that's nothing; I have also been reading the Local Government Act 1972!). In their minutes it stated that the goalposts on their playing field had been taken away. Not the first time in Local Government the goalposts have been moved.

A letter from the Team Rector

Dear Friends

After much prayer and discussion, and for a variety of reasons, Angela and I have decided that it is best both for us and for this benefice if I move to a new appointment. Accordingly, I have applied for, and been accepted for, the post of Rector of the Benefice of St Benedict in Norwich Diocese, a benefice comprising five parishes centred on the village of Horning on the North Norfolk Broads. This new appointment is to a benefice which we have known for many years, and indeed where we have worshipped on several occasions, wondering perhaps if it might one day become vacant at an opportune time.

As many of you will know, there remain on-going issues in the wider Church of England regarding the ministry of women and Episcopal oversight, and the resulting arrangements have proved less than straightforward in the context of a team ministry. However, we remain immensely grateful for the help, support, and fellowship we have received in North Cheltenham, from colleagues and parishioners alike. We shall certainly be sad to leave the benefice, and indeed Gloucester Diocese and its cathedral, where we were both ordained, but we are also looking forward to the move to an area we know well.

Arrangements have yet to be finalised, but it is likely that I will be installed in this new post in late July, so that I will relinquish my role as Team Rector in late June or early July. In the meantime, we shall continue to serve the benefice to the best of our ability, and ask for your prayers and support as we prepare for the move.

As I visit people in homes or hospital who have memory problems, I can always guarantee that if I begin saying 'Our Father, who art in heaven' that they will join in.



Gloucester Cathedral has just hosted a skate park in the nave. Indeed as I write it has an art exhibition in the cloisters. It has hosted two of the greatest sculpture exhibitions in the country over the past ten years. It is very much a part of the community and has been for almost five hundred years. Before that it was an Abbey which, though a closed Benedictine order, still served the community. For instance it very usefully built the New Inn and The Mitre. The former is still the best preserved coaching inn in the country.

Peter Petrie told us of its long history both as a cathedral and beforehand. To me one of the most interesting facets of its existence is the part played by Edward II. Now as a king Edward was rubbish. He had a toy boy in Piers Gaveston who came to a sticky end and Edward also is famed as coming to an even stickier one, though the actual details of his supposed death at Berkeley Castle are debated. Indeed a few years back Peter Petrie told us of how there was even a body of opinion that Edward was not killed at Berkeley and buried at Gloucester but actually abdicated to a quiet monastery in Italy, letting his much more capable son take over. The best that can be said here is that the tale is possible but not probable. Anyway, despite all his shortcomings Edward did his bit for the Cathedral because after his death the good folk of England suddenly decided he was a saintly figure and they came to the Abbey in numbers as pilgrims. This meant money and between that and the fact that Edward III decided his dad's final resting place needed doing up, it allowed the remodelling of the holy end of the church in the magnificent perpendicular style we see there today. It is also the reason that the abbey built the inns; they were needed to accommodate the pilgrims. More, when Henry VIII was knocking down abbeys in the mid sixteenth century it was the presence of a previous king at Gloucester that persuaded him to let the building stand and create a new diocese. So if it was not for the rather shabby Edward II we would not have one of the greatest Cathedrals in England on our doorstep.

Anyway, suffice to say that Peter's tale was a terrific one very well told.

Our next talk, in May, will be on the Arts and Crafts Movement as illustrated by those firms, many local to the Cotswolds, who made chairs and other furniture. It will be given by Dave Walton who is a considerable expert on the subject. As always non-members are most welcome so if you have an artistic bone in your body or like sitting on chairs you should come along.

With regards to the Joint Core Strategy, well there are signs that the Examiner has taken at least some of our points on board. She seems keen that Gloucester and Tewkesbury take their fair share of new housing rather than dumping the requirement on Cheltenham, with, it must be said, CBC's agreement. She also seems fairly pro the open green space ideas put forward by the Parish Council. However, we do not really know how it will play yet but she has promised to put out her initial thoughts towards the end of May.

Save the Countryside

Everyone is invited to our 9th Annual Save the Countryside Walk on **Sunday 22nd May at 2pm.**

We would love to have you join us to celebrate our beautiful countryside surrounding Swindon Village for the 9th year since our challenge to save it began.

Since May last year the team have worked as key participants on the Government Inspector's Inquiry on the Joint Core Strategy (JCS) for Cheltenham, Gloucester and Tewkesbury's 20 year development plans. We continue to work in collaboration with the Parish Council and our colleagues across the town in Cheltenham Alliance.

We have written many reports, provided tours of the area, presented evidence at the hearings with the Council's JCS team, the developers and other concerned parties including our partners in Cheltenham Alliance.

So far, as the overall plan has not been agreed, no planning applications have been made by developers. We expect that this inquiry will continue well into this year with no decision being made on our green belt land around Swindon Village until next year. But the inspector is minded to share her views from time to time and has certainly listened and understood our strong arguments and evidence and she agrees with our argument for sequential planning i.e. building on brownfield sites before greenbelt and our Local Green Space application.

I hope on the day to be able to give everyone a clear update of the latest status and indications of the inspector's decisions that will impact our area forever.

How wonderful that so many of us have enjoyed this community event for so many years.

The Big Community Switch

Residents in Gloucestershire are being invited to take part in the latest Big Community Switch auction. The Big Community Switch scheme is supported by Gloucestershire County Council and could help you to save money on your gas and electricity bills. It is available to residents on dual and single tariffs and those with pre-payment meters. Registration for the next auction ends on 16th May.

The scheme helps households potentially save money on their energy bills by using a reverse auction and a principle of bulk buying energy. Residents can register for the scheme online or over the phone; the more people who register the cheaper the quote will be as the scheme offers the big energy companies the opportunity to compete for the customers. This often results in cheaper energy quotes, and residents will receive a quote once the auction has ended. There is no obligation to accept the quote or switch energy provider.
