The Joint Core Strategy (JCS) pre-submission consultation rumbles on. This stage has to consider whether the plan is “sound and legal” before it is sent to the Secretary of State for consideration. Due to IT problems the email address advertised for the submission of comments was changed. There is no guarantee that emails sent to the old address will ever surface so anything submitted before 22nd July should be sent again (though by the time you read this it will be too late!). The consultation period was extended by a week as a result. As I write this the JCS web site that details the consultation process is “unavailable”. The process seems to be descending into farce. Aside from whether or not the JCS is valid there are now question marks over the whole consultation process. Hopefully the Secretary of State will look at the big picture when the plan goes before him. The equivalent plan for the Stroud area was rejected.

The next Parish Council meeting will include a Neighbourhood Co-ordination Group Meeting. Whilst this sounds intimidating it simply means that representatives of the County and Borough Councils and the Police will be present to assist the Parish Council and members of the public with any matters they wish to raise. The meeting will start at 7:00pm at Swindon Village Hall. We are hoping interested members of the public will attend. The Parish Council are particularly concerned about traffic management and road safety in the area but please come along and raise any issues you have. You can tell members of three councils and the police what you think of them on the same evening!

The poppies planted in the park in commemoration of the start of World War I have been a hit with people that I have spoken to. The Borough Council are keen to receive feedback so let them (or me) know if you have views one way or the other. On the subject of the park we have had two visits from travellers. The Borough Council and the Police have taken swift and effective action each time. The Borough Council plan to install a height restriction bar at the entrance to the park. Hopefully this will prevent further incursions.

The overgrown hedge along Manor Road was reported by me, a Parish Councillor and at least one member of the public. Perhaps because of this the County Council were stirred to action. However, the good weather seems to have resulted in a fantastic growing season so I am sure it will need cutting back again soon. Hopefully our allotment holders are seeing the benefit of the good weather as well.

Peter, the Chairman of the Parish Council, has asked me to include information in the Village News about the planning applications that we receive and consider. This is a good idea since planning forms a major part of the Parish Council's business. Ironically, it has suddenly gone very quiet on the planning front! I am planning (sorry)

to mention the specific applications received each month but I will also write a separate article to tell you about the planning process. It takes two or three weeks for an article written for the Village News to reach your doormat. Since the consultation period for planning applications is typically three weeks it will not usually be possible for me to let you know of applications in time for you to comment. However, it will give you a flavour of what is happening. If applications are major and/or controversial we do our best to make sure the people affected know about them. Gallagher Retail Park has been undergoing a major facelift with the Parish Council recently consulted on the third phase. Generally we recognise the works as improvements but we are mindful that sometimes the needs of pedestrians and the disabled are not adequately provided for.

The Parish Council's annual audit has been successfully concluded with the auditors giving us a clean bill of health (and taking some of our money!).

The Parish Council was consulted on a licence application from Cheltenham Town Football Club which now operates the "Seasons" site in Quat Goose Lane. The required statutory notices were published but the Parish Council were concerned that this was inadequate and that local residents living in the vicinity of the complex should have been consulted directly. Both the Parish Council and local residents objected to the proposed terms of the licence. Sensibly, Cheltenham Town Football Club made some concessions in terms of the hours of operation and the holding of outdoor events. The Borough Council also imposed some additional conditions. Cheltenham Town Football Club have emphasised their desire to be responsible neighbours. Hopefully a good relationship can be maintained between the Football Club, the Parish Council and the residents living close to "Seasons".

So to the changing of the seasons (two bad puns in one article!). Gloucestershire Rural Community Council are offering training on how to cope with conditions of extreme heat whilst at the same time Gloucestershire County Council want to know the name of our snow warden and how many bags of road salt we think we will need.

Towards the end of September we celebrate the feast of Saint Michael and All Angels. Angels are often the heralds of new starts, as they bear messages from God – often to the most unsuspecting people! An elderly woman is told she will have children. A young unmarried woman is told she will give birth to God's son. A group of shepherds are told to leave their sheep and head off to Bethlehem. These are but a few examples - the Bible is full of them.

Often the first thing the angel has to say is 'Do not be afraid!' as the person they are delivering the message to seems petrified! Whether it's the shock of an angel or the knowledge that it's quite likely that God has a plan for them that they can't quite believe, we don't know. I suspect it's a mixture of both.

What we can be sure of, is that God doesn't expect more of us than he knows we are capable of, and that if we turn to God in faith and trust, he will equip us to do more than we can possibly imagine. So if you, or someone you love, is anxious about a new start, pray that you may know God's presence alongside you, and God will enable you to do more than you might think you can.

A View from the Pew

Some thoughts about how we express ourselves

About 50 years after Jesus' resurrection and the birth of Christianity Jesus' brother wrote an open letter to some new followers of the new faith. Looking at this ancient letter I was struck how, with a bit of constructive modernisation, James' advice can be very useful to us. James wrote: "We all make mistakes in all kinds of ways, but the man who can claim that he never says the wrong thing can consider himself perfect, for if he can control his tongue he can control every other part of his personality!" I certainly have wished I hadn't said something and wished to take it back!

James continues: "Men control the movements of a large animal like a horse with a tiny bit placed in its mouth. The human tongue is physically small, but what tremendous effects it can boast of. It has vast potentialities for evil. It can poison the whole body, it can make the whole life a blazing hell."

I had just been reading about what people had written in their emails and on places like Twitter and had regretted it later. These people had written some awful stuff in emails or tweets which they regretted later. I am still shocked when I learn the sort of thing that teenagers say to each other in emails.

The internet and everything that goes with it is a marvellous thing but it's also something that we have to be careful about. James warned us about the tongue. I think we should be careful about what we write and the power of the written word. James goes on: "Beasts, birds, reptiles and all kinds of sea creatures can be tamed by man, but no one can tame the human tongue. It is an evil always liable to break out, and the poison it spreads is deadly".

The Swindon Village Society

In July Geoff Millar told us about the German occupation of Guernsey. He was not there himself but he was told all about it by his aunt and uncle who were. I had not realised that all those who lived on the islands but who were not actually from the islands were deported to Germany and spent many years in an internment camp. Fortunately this was in Bavaria and so they were at least out of the way of the worst of the bombing but it was not a happy time. In Britain we did something similar by interning those of German background on the Isle of Man. On the Channel Islands there was a mix of resistance and collaboration but it must have been very difficult to know what was for the best in a small island community where there was no opportunity to take to the hills or flee. One of the most surprising facts to me was that one of the most senior German officers went back to the island after the war and ran a successful boarding house there for many years. This was a fascinating, almost firsthand, account of a part of the war that most of us have not thought about.

Our Garden Party took place. What is more, most of it took place in the garden which, given that the last remnants of Hurricane Bertha were wafting around, shows the resilience of those members who came along. The cat which owns our garden greatly appreciated the company and has applied to become a Society member but this will need further discussion at the AGM.

JCS goes on (and on, and on). The Village Society has made a representation which it hopes will influence the inspectorate when it comes around to that stage. The only real game is the numbers – the JCS backers will flannel their way through any other issues. As such the Cheltenham Alliance, of which the Village Society and Save The Countryside are very much a part, have put in a twenty six page submission with a detailed analysis of what we believe the Office of National Statistics numbers say. Scout Activate Camp - Kidderminster

Our first weekend camp of the summer was the Activate camp at Rhydd Covert Scout Camp Site – right next door to the West Midland Safari Park in Worcestershire. This is a beautiful woodland campsite with small grass clearings for camping and we were blessed with gorgeous weather throughout the weekend. On site the Scouts tackled: climbing, abseiling, air rifles and archery. Malvern Challenge – Cleeve Hill

As this year was the final time that the Malvern Challenge and Sun Run camps were to be held, the organisers promised to go out on a high with the biggest and best events ever – and they didn't disappoint! Rachel, Sos and Shane were all present at the very first Malvern Challenge weekend way back in 1987 (at Malvern!) - and it has been a joy to see how the camps have evolved and developed into the incredible events that they are today.

This year we took our largest ever party to the Malvern Challenge: 21 Scouts and 7 leaders, as well as a couple of Explorer Scouts who were helping the site team. We were joined by around 4000 Scouts and Guides from across the UK. This was the weekend when the summer weather started so, apart from some light rain on the Friday evening and a lovely thundery shower on Saturday afternoon, the weekend was fine and sunny.

It was action packed from start to finish with many guest performers and star acts at the Friday night party including "Mr Methane" and X-Factor finalists "Kingsland Road". On Saturday our Scouts split into five teams and tackled the Malvern Challenge and Cotswold Challenge activity hikes. Our most successful team was made up of Jessica & Bethan Avery, Jessica Dermody, Jakub Kubinak and Ben Rodrigues: Out of 264 teams on the Cotswold Challenge, they managed to win Check Point 1, the Laser Clay Shooting, with the highest average team score and were duly presented with medals and a trophy on the Sunday morning. It's only the second time in 27 years that we've had a winning team, so huge congratulations to them all.

On Saturday evening there was music, entertainment, competitions and sports to keep everyone busy. Down in the barn we had the Talent Show finals followed by African Acrobats, 'freak-act' Garry Stretch and the star act Stavros Flatley from Britain's Got Talent (who was excellent entertainment)! Finally, to round off another great evening we were entertained by fire act "Flame Oz" on the field stage.

On the Sunday everyone took part in the Malvern Challenge Fayre, with over 100 different activities including craft fair, simulators, quad bikes, fairground rides, shooting, archery, zorbing and lots of inflatables and an opportunity to handle wild and exotic birds and animals. The arena events included a falconry display, acrobats, a display from stunt driver Jez Avery, and live music from Dale Williams - only at the Malvern Challenge!

An absolutely terrific weekend that will live long in the memory of all those who were present. And an almost impossible task to “follow that” for the team involved in setting up the new event called “Strategy” that will take place at Cirencester Park next June.
