At its January meeting, the Parish Council set its budget for the next financial year (2023-2024). The budget may be summarised as follows.

- Projected income (other than precept) £1,487.00
- Precept (unchanged) £12,175.58
- Projected expenditure £19,164.19
- Funding from reserves £5,501.61

We get some income from renting the allotments and from advertising in the Village news, but the bulk of our income comes from the precept (a charge which residents pay through their council tax). We decided to leave the precept unchanged again, and to make up any shortfall from reserves. With some new homes having been built in the parish this means that a "band D" household will see a small decrease in what they pay towards the Parish Council (from £17.36 to £17.21 per annum). These are difficult times and we don't want to make life harder for families already feeling the pinch.



We have continuing problems with gas canisters being used for recreational purposes and then discarded in our lanes and streets. It is not just the small, shiny metal canisters but much larger ones as well. The gas canisters have legitimate uses and their sale is not restricted.

Alison took this matter up with the police and with Laurence Robertson MP. As a result of Alison's

persistence we received a response from Mr. Robertson. Questions have been asked in parliament. The government is awaiting the recommendations of the Advisory Council on the Misuse of Drugs (ACMD). It is likely that legislation will be brought before parliament to restrict sales of the canisters.



At present it may not be illegal to use these gas containers for "recreational purposes" but dumping them in the streets for others to clear up certainly is.

You will read elsewhere in this issue about the Annual Parish Meeting. It will be held on 26th April in the Village Hall. As if the opportunity to discuss local issues with your councillors isn't a sufficient draw, we will be looking to turn it into a social event and will be offering FREE PIZZA.

You may have heard that, in future, voters in local and parliamentary elections will be required to produce photo id. Some areas of the County will have local elections in May. However, the next scheduled elections to take place in Cheltenham are in May 2024 so I'll say more about this nearer the time.

You may recall that we hosted a visit from the Digibus in early 2022. This is a double decker bus which has been converted to act as a mobile classroom for people wishing to understand more about everyday technology. From using a smartphone, tablet or PC to accessing online services, the tutors can help- and it is free. Here are some examples of topics that the staff can cover:

- Staying safe on the Internet whilst browsing, shopping, etc.
- Using online banking
- Making doctor's appointments or ordering medication from your phone or tablet
- Writing letters and CVs and applying for jobs
- Using your device to make video calls with friends and relatives

They are happy to tackle anything technology-related.


The bus will be parked at the Village Hall on 19th April and 10th May. Pop the dates in your diary and come along to chat.

Just who are Swindon Parish Council?

We are a friendly team from all sorts of different backgrounds, but we all have one thing in common - we love where we live and want to safeguard the parish for future generations, as well as improve the parish now.

Swindon Parish Council should have 9 councillors, but currently we only have 6. We need a minimum of 3 councillors present to run a meeting. We are keen to get more people involved in the Parish Council and in particular are looking to fill the 3 empty spaces.

Over the coming years there will be big changes within the parish, with the upcoming Elms Park development, the M5 Junction 10 work, and planning the local green spaces - so this is your opportunity to help shape how these developments unfold. With more councillors we can do more things - for example, putting more work into fighting climate change locally.

Who can be on the parish council?

Anyone can be a councillor if you are a UK citizen and live within 3 miles of the parish. It is a voluntary position. No training or prior knowledge is needed, though training is available if you want to get more deeply involved.

What does it involve?

We have a monthly meeting (which is open to the public) where we address issues raised by members of the parish, review any planning applications big and small that have been made and consider other issues local to the parish, such as green spaces, sustainability, littering, roads, footpaths, speed limits, warm spaces, etc.

How much time do I need to give?

We understand time can be precious. Our current parish councillors are busy people with jobs and some have young children. There is no set time commitment you would need to give - you can be involved as much or as

little as you want to.

The meetings once a month generally last around 2 hours. Very occasionally we have extra meetings when there is a particularly important issue, or something that requires urgent action. For example, reviewing documents related to the Elms Park development. As these extra meetings are not open to the public, they are generally held at someone's house & involve snacks! The more councillors we have, the more things we can do.

Councillor James Cornish (Chair)

James has lived in the parish since 2017 with his wife Zara. He joined the parish council in 2018, where he took the lead on many projects, and he was elected chair of the council last year.

James' a physicist by training and an engineer by practise, his work is out of this world working for a space business. James also guest lectures and mentors at Lancaster University. Outside of work he is a keen walker, swimmer and bookworm – loving science fiction and politics.

James joined the council because he wanted to make a difference locally as well as make friends in a new town. He is really proud of the role the council and local volunteers played supporting vulnerable households during the pandemic.



Councillor Lisa Whitaker (Vice-Chair)


Councillor Lisa Whitaker moved to Swindon Village in 2020, having lived across town in St Marks for the previous 13 years. She became a Parish Councillor shortly afterwards, and was elected Vice Chair in 2022. The main reason was to get to know the community, and contribute to the betterment of the Parish.

Since joining she's learned a lot about the history of the area, as well as local planning, and the who's who of Swindon Parish!

Outside of the council, Lisa works full time as a Senior Project Manager for Gloucestershire-based sustainability charity, Severn Wye Energy Agency, supporting businesses, households and communities with conserving energy and cutting carbon emissions, as well as leading fuel-poverty relief schemes off the back of the pandemic.

She has a primary school aged son, and you may see her with her family cycling around town – she's passionate about active travel (walking, cycling, scooting or anything that involves getting around on your own steam) and making this an easier choice for everyone.

She also organised last year's Community Garage Sale – which was well received in the Parish and plans for this year's spring-clean clear out are already afoot!

It is with much sadness and regret, that I write the final report for Swindon Village Wine Club.



Motorbikes and Thin Places!

As I enter my seventh year as the Team Rector, one quiet delight has been to discover the number of transport aficionados in our parish – the 'Tesco train' springs to mind! There is also a love of motorcycles, with a dealership too, of course, originally belonging to Dave Parry. Another delight over the years, has been the enthusiasm for outdoor church services, like our own 'Praise in the Park' each July and also those in the Celtic tradition. You might wonder what connection there might be between these two things!

Your Rector has been a keen motorcyclist, starting with a Honda XL125, graduating through some 'big thumpers' of trail bikes, so hard to get going that you had to jump on the kickstart, and concluding with a silky smooth four cylinder Kawasaki 650.

As these bikes grew larger, I was able to escape over the original Severn Bridge and head into South Wales, the Wye Valley and the Brecon Beacons. Nothing can be more delightful than climbing on that Kawasaki in the warmth of a July afternoon, electric start and through the lanes to the Bridge with the river glinting silver below, laden with a summer haze. There was the road into Chepstow and up the floor of the Wye to Monmouth, your eye sometimes caught by salmon arcing in the river around Tintern Abbey. The Brecon Beacons lay in their own peace, accessible by steep single lane tracks, larks singing and gorse plentiful. You could lie down and 'cloud watch' and not see another human being for hours. A ride westwards took you into the Valleys, with lines of terraced houses and the mines and steelworks still open, a wonderful world of extended families and heavy industry.

One ride I remember took me to Llanthony Abbey, an annual pilgrimage site today. The bike's engine pinged in the hot sun as it cooled from the journey, the smell of the tyres' warm rubber filled the air. I scooped fresh spring water to drink from the stream by the abbey. Around me,



goldfinches and robins sang joyfully, and small deer graced nearby forest tracks. In a mystical moment, it seemed that the boundary between heaven and earth was removed, and God's presence permeated the place. The Romantic poets like William Wordsworth and lovers of the picturesque before him, opened up these sites for those stuck in the new cities, bereft of their rural roots and reconnecting them in poetry and tours. In that moment, God was reconnecting me with His love and His embrace in the beautiful stillness.

It will be spring soon and the chance to enjoy some of our own Celtic Communions as we move outdoors on balmy spring and summer evenings, where the language and music are as soft as the sunshine. Our Celtic services at St Mary Magdalene Church, Elmstone Hardwicke run twice monthly, and we've also held Celtic Communions in the churchyard, on Cleeve Hill, and by the old canal behind the Swan pub on the A38. We are hoping that Hailes Abbey might allow us to hold a service in the ruins there. Come along and give these services a try. We always finish up with lots of laughter and chat over refreshments!



First, I have to say that the date of the March talk on H H Martyn as published on the cover of the Village News last month was wrong – the talk is on Wednesday 15th March, not the 18th. My mistake and not the News's. I really could do with a competent secretary- any volunteers? No, I thought not.

Well the AGM went pretty much as forecast in the last edition of the news so I am still writing these reports. Are you all quite sure there are no volunteers for secretary? We did have a good turn out and enough subscriptions to make us look OK for the year.

After the AGM (only twenty five minutes) and a cuppa, Helen Wells gave us a first rate run down on the big local plans. The expansion of M5 junction 10 is going to be very expensive with a complete rebuild finishing in a large roundabout very similar to that at junction 11 between Cheltenham and Gloucester. The A4019 will be dual carriageway at least as far as Sainsbury's with a major road branching halfway along heading south to the new cyber-park. It was interesting to hear that the Home Farm plans are really no further forward and the land has not as yet been purchased by the tentative developers. Maybe there is hope there? She also gave us a good run down on the developments planned for the A419 at the Air Balloon with a whole new dual carriageway road being built parallel to the current road. The Air Balloon itself is already shut. While I find this rather sad given its historic background, I do regret not trying to get a Grade One listing for the traffic jam; probably the most famous jam in the country! And thanks, Helen, for passing us your notes and visual displays which all who are on our e-mail list should have received. If any non-members would like to see these send me an e-mail to barry_simon@hotmail.com and I will send them on.

Now back to the H H Martyn talk. I have heard from sources in the village that there are a few folks living here who worked for them and

who hope to be along. So I will repeat the things I said in the last edition. Martyn's and Co was once the largest employer in this area. They made many fittings for the great ocean liners of the time such as The Queens Mary and Elizabeth; decorations and fittings for Parliament including the Speaker's chair; decorations for Buckingham Palace and metal gates for Marble Arch. They also ended up being one of the founders of the Dowty Company and the Gloster Aviation Company which made many great aircraft including Britain's first jet aircraft. This was built in Regents Garage which is where the Regent's Arcade now stands.

So even if you didn't work for these companies, come along. New members are always welcome. Family membership is £20, single membership is £10. And visitors are welcome at any meeting for £2. We will be glad to see you



Chickpea, Yogurt and Feta, One Pot Dish

Serves 4



Ingredients:

1 can Chickpeas

An onion

A large carrot

Celery

1-2 sticks of celery

Mushrooms

1 pepper

Black olives

Garlic

Plain Yoghurt

1/2-1 block of feta

1 carton of passata

1 tbsp of tomato puree

Z'atar – a Middle Eastern spice mix, can be made using thyme, cumin, coriander, sumac and sesame seeds

Cider vinegar

Ginger

Chilli flakes



I like to serve this with simple lemon and coriander cous cous.

Method:

- 1.In some oil add the cut onion, garlic, carrots, celery, chilli flakes and ginger to a frying pan, the wider the better!
- 2.After the hard veg has softened a little add the chopped softer veg, peppers, mushrooms and olives and add just under a tablespoon of z'atar and cook for a further 5 minutes I always end up adding more chilli flakes the yoghurt at the end cools this down!
- 3. Then add the passata and a little water in the carton to get all of the passata out, add the tomato puree and a splash of vinegar, if you add too much you can balance it with some sugar.
- 4.Add the chickpeas and season with salt and pepper to taste...possibly some more chilli here too...
- 5. Simmer this for about 10 minutes.
- 6.Dollop on spots of yoghurt, as much or as little as you'd like, and then crumble the feta over the top of the yogurt.
- 7.Put under the grill for around 10 minutes until the feta has turned a little brown .
- 8.Serves with cous cous, rice or bread and enjoy!





