A Note From The Editor

I am lucky enough to be going away in a couple of days with two friends. We go every year to a Spa Hotel in Leicestershire where we have a lovely relaxing time eating, swimming, reading and chatting. Carol is my oldest friend. She is 25 days older than me – I remind her of that regularly – and I have known her forever. We grew up together and although we don't see each other much during the year, this is our chance to catch up and put the world to rights. The time in between seeing each other melts away and it take minutes to be giggling away again.

My other companion is my long-suffering friend and business partner. In contrast, we spend most of the week together working, and the weekends comparing silly stories. A controversial planning application has been made for the installation of a 5G telecommunications antenna in Rivelands Road. The government sees economic and social benefits to improving digital connectivity and 5G is seen as a key part of this. However, 5G uses higher frequencies than previous generations of technology and, as a result, requires antennae to be taller and closer together.

Because it is government policy to roll out 5G services, any argument against the principle of 5G would be doomed to failure. We can, however, argue that the siting of antennae is inappropriate. To date, Cheltenham Borough Council has refused permission for at least three 5G antennae. The Parish Council will oppose the application for our area on the basis that, at 17m tall, the proposed antenna would be a dominant feature in a Conservation Area.

Understanding that 5G rollout will happen, the Parish Council hopes to engage with the planners and the developer to consider the constraints of the technology and possibly identify potential locations that meet those constraints whilst minimising the impact on residents and the visual amenity of the area.

We continue to struggle in our war against fly tippers and litter louts. The picture to the right shows yet further desecration of our area. This example is along Manor Road. Since this happened more rubbish has been dumped along Brockhampton Lane.


A Cheltenham man has been prosecuted for fly-tipping. He dumped waste building materials and books in the Forest of Dean. He was found guilty at Cheltenham magistrates court and was fined a total of more than £7,000. If you see people engaged in this disgusting practice it would be brilliant if you could get vehicle numbers and advise the police.

Let's get more of these people prosecuted!

The Cheltenham Festival race meeting has come and gone. This year fewer tickets were sold and more toilets and stewards were deployed in an attempt to reduce antisocial behaviour. My first reaction was that matters seemed to have improved over previous years, but we would be keen to hear the views of local residents.

The Parish Council moved its meetings from the second Tuesday of each month to the second Monday. in April and May we now find that our meetings clash with the Bank Holidays so our next two meetings will be on 12th April and 15th May. Remember too that the Annual Parish Meeting is on 26th April.

The Digibus will be parked in the car park of Swindon Village Hall on 19th April and 10th May. Their tutors will be able to offer you free help with any technology issues (phones, tablets, Internet banking, creating and printing documents, booking appointments, etc.).





On the subject of the car park, we continue to pursue grant funding to assist our purchase. If we are successful this will secure the car park as a community asset for the foreseeable future.

At our March meeting we were delighted to welcome Lynne Allen as our newest councillor. Lynne was concerned that she would not be able to put in a huge amount of time to the role. However, everyone can make a valuable contribution, recognising that we all have other commitments in our lives. Lynne is already getting stuck and is a valuable member of the team. We still have two vacancies.

To round off, here are the profiles of two more of our councillors.

Councillor Helen Wells has loved living in Swindon Village for 16 years. She lives here with her husband Rich and daughter Emma. They came here when Emma was a baby! It's a beautiful place, with a lovely community that she is so proud to support as a Parish Councillor for many years.

Helen works full time for Mondelēz International as a Global Partner Manager which means that she is responsible for their global IT services which are outsourced to



global partner suppliers. It's a demanding senior position with some irregular hours, meeting virtually with team and colleagues all over the world. Home Farm Outline Planning Application



Your Swindon Parish Council would like to draw your urgent attention to the recent Outline Planning application that has recently been submitted to Cheltenham Borough Council to build 180 houses at Home Farm, just off Quat Goose Lane (planning reference number 23/00354/OUT).

You may have already received a letter in the post from Cheltenham Borough Council explaining this proposal and the ways that you can provide the Borough Council with your feedback on this proposal, which, if approved, will be a significant addition to the village in number of ways.

Please do take the time to look at this planning proposal as soon as possible via the Cheltenham Borough Council's website (www.cheltenham.gov.uk/publicaccess), or make an appointment to visit in person at the Municipal Office in town (ring 01242 264321).

Cheltenham Borough Council advises that it will only accept residents' comments in relation to:

- -Noise or disturbance from the development (but not from the construction work itself),
- -Traffic,
- -Visual impact,
- -Privacy,
- -Amenity.

All of these aspects are relevant to this development, but traffic and amenities are probably the most important aspects in terms of the constraints of the narrow village roads, especially Quat Goose Lane to safely support the literally hundreds of additional vehicles associated with 180 houses; as well as the impact on public amenities such as schooling, especially with regards to the village school, for example.

There are very likely to be many other considerations and concerns that residents will identify as well – all of which need to be provided via the planning portal to the Borough Council before the planning process deadline.

The statutory schedule for this process is quite tight, so please don't delay in finding out more about the proposal, discuss it with your neighbours and parish councillors because the Borough Council will not accept your comments after 11th April 2023.

The process of submitting your comments to the Borough Council does not take long to complete online and every single submission counts to make sure the Borough Council fully understands all the issues related to this planning proposal – only the residents can have this insight and the community will have to live with the day-to-day implications if the Borough Council doesn't have all the information to consider when making is decision.

If you use the Swindon Parish Council and/or Swindon Parish (Cheltenham) Community Group Facebook, please keep an eye out there the links and information. The Parish Council will endeavour to provide more information on parish notice boards and flyers, where possible.









There is an Easter story of a 25-year-old soldier clutching a picture of his pregnant wife, as he is flown by helicopter, stirring up the sandy dust, into the military hospital in the isolated desert compound in Helmand, Afghanistan. Doctors immediately begin working on him, attaching drips and cutting his clothing off. As he accidentally crumples the photo of his wife, he begs the doctors to get him back to his wife. He manages a raspy: "I promised...I promised I'd meet my son." Then darkness falls. He has lost many pints of blood, and his legs and more are completely gone. One doctor asks, "Will he even want to survive?" They wheel him in the operating room uncertain he will make it through the hours of surgery ahead. A nurse tenderly removes the bloodstained, creased photo of his wife from stiff hands and props it by his side.

Doubt is heavy in the air before this soldier's surgery even starts. The medical staff have now seen several dozens of men like him. When the soldiers come around after days of powerful pain medications, many see amputation as a brick wall. Amputee soldiers are often sent home emotionally, without limbs, spiritually empty, and unable to process what has happened to them. The doctors and nurses go through the same dedicated motions each time desperately trying to save their physical life, knowing many soldier's spirits die exhausted before they ever reach the operating table.


When this young soldier awoke his first words were to thank all the staff profusely for saving his life and then he thanked God for guiding their hands in his healing. The staff carefully repeated the severity of his injuries and the extent of his loss. He replied that he already knew how bad he was hurt when he was put in the helicopter. "God was with me and got me this far," he explained to the nurses.



Instead of the overwhelming grief the nurses were used to, this soldier grinned saying, "I'm still living and that's something, isn't it?" It was gratitude that poured out of him, not sorrow or despair. He was grateful that he would get home and meet his unborn child.

"I'm still living." I believe that living in hope is living in resurrection. There is a wooden Easter egg from the Ukrainian Christians. On the egg, it says: 'Christos Boskresseya' – Christ is risen. The Orthodox word for Sunday is 'Boskresenya' – or 'up through the cross'. What a marvelous word for the first day of the week. Not our bland 'Sun – day', or day of the sun, but: up through the cross. This young soldier's determined spirit despite his devastating loss is a reminder there is life beyond loss. In Christ, we can imagine a new world of wholeness and healing, a world in which the lost are found, and the dead live. In Christ, we are called to imagine a world with resurrection – resurrection in the lives of ordinary people facing extraordinary challenges and all up through the Cross.

Philippa blazes a trail in Paris

On 9th March, Philippa Denmead of Hyde Lane took to the court in Paris as part of the first ever GB team to compete in a women's international wheelchair rugby match. They defeated Canada 42-21. Yes girls!

With such a strong start to the tournament, the team were confident that they were playing well, but they had a further four matches to play if they were to be victorious. The girls were in the mood for winning and beat OnePoint 44-19, then Aquabion 44-20, and finally Les Energies 46-15, which put them through to the gold medal match. Did they win? It was never in doubt. They triumphed 44-32 over Aquabion to become the 2023 champions of the Women's Cup.

You may know that wheelchair rugby is sometimes known as murderball. If you didn't know this, find a match online and you'll soon see why. It is fast paced and electric to watch as ramming your chair into your opponent to tackle them for the ball is all part of the game.

Philippa and her team mates usually play in mixed gender teams, but with the growing number of participants and some highly skilled players in the domestic league, GB women's wheelchair rugby is going from strength to strength. The Women's Cup is an opportunity for national teams to compete against each other, and for women from smaller nations to meet and form teams to give them valuable match experience.

On her return from Paris, I interviewed Philippa to find out more about her love for the game and her trailblazing experience in the GB squad.



What got you into wheelchair rugby?

I started playing wheelchair rugby in 2015 after a lecturer at university recommended it. I wanted a team sport that would give me the same buzz as playing hockey, so I gave it a go and loved it!

What skills do you need to be a good player?

You need to be very tactical, aggressive on the ball, calm when things aren't going your way, and have good chair control.

What did you enjoy most about the Women's Cup?

I loved the Women's Cup as it was the first ever all female GB team. It was great to be playing in a stadium at the foot of the Eiffel Tower with female players from all over the world. There were players representing a total of nine countries. And, obviously, to win gold was a nice way to end the tournament!

What do you hope to achieve next in your playing career?

We are hoping to enter more tournaments across the world as a women's team; however, this is dependent on funding. GB Wheelchair Rugby (the national association) are hoping to fund us to attend the Women's Cup again in 2025. It isn't being held next year because many teams will be focussing on the mixed teams playing in the Paralympics, which are being hosted in Paris. For me personally, my next big event is the national league on the first weekend in April where I will be playing for my current team, The Ospreys, who are based in Swansea.

I am also hoping that women's matches will get more exposure in the sports columns so that potential participants realise that this isn't just a sport for men.



I hope to encourage more women to come and give it a go because it is so much fun!



In February David Cramp came to tell us about the birds of Gloucestershire. One of the most interesting facts was that 330 different types of bird have been logged in the county. Now when the society takes its annual bird walk through the village and off down Dog Bark Lane or Brockhampton Lane we hope to log around 25 different varieties of feathered things. We are going to have to up our game.

The Society did have one great coup. Several years ago it was decided that we would take a look at the Coombe Hill nature reserve. Long being an advocate that time spent in reconnaissance is never wasted, I went there on the Thursday prior to the actual visit to check the going, because the reserve can be muddy. In fact it was fine. When I reached the main pool I did see one white bird that I did not immediately recognise. Swan, no, Egret, no, Farmyard Goose, no. So I retraced my steps to the car park and there was an obvious birder, field glasses, camera with long lens, talking to some folks about the restoration of the hide after it had been damaged by floods. So I sidled up to hear what he had to say. When he had finished he asked if I had seen anything. Well, I said that I knew it was daft but I thought I had seen a spoonbill, maybe an escapee from Slimbridge. To say he moved fast would be an understatement; off he shot.

I thought no more of the matter until the Saturday when we few walkers went off to Coombe Hill to find the car park full and the area packed with groups of folk all with field glasses and cameras with long lenses. It had indeed been an African Spoonbill and the news had gone viral. We did see the poor thing across the pool trying its best to look inconspicuous and wondering who all the people were and why they were there. I wish I could have got near enough to have apologised to it. So that was the Village Society's only bird watching first prize.



We have had some lesser moments though with a kingfisher in the amenity area, a spotted flycatcher in 2000 and early sightings of red kites before they became common in the Vale. Indeed it was good to see a kite over the centre of the village just a few weeks ago.

One other bird point since we are here. In a chat at a gathering before Christmas it became obvious that different gardens in the village have very different bird life. We have all the tits while others rarely see a long tailed tit but are rife with goldcrests of which we see none. So we have augmented our fat ball feeder with a couple of other types of feeders and are trying to tempt some strangers with sunflower seeds.

In April we are going to take our annual stroll, but this time we are going to Painswick, led by John Heathcott, but on more of a history walk than a bird walk. Meeting time and place are on the front cover. If anyone wants a lift we will try to fit you in, member or non member. It might be best if you could send me an e-mail in advance just to make sure we have enough seats

Chocolate Fridge Cake

A really simple recipe that you don't need to cook! I like my completely plain with no optional added ingredients, just like I used to have when I was younger.

Ingredients: Makes 12 squares



- 250g plain digestives
- 150g of your favourite milk chocolate
- 150 dark chocolate
- 100g unsalted butter
- 150g golden syrup
- Optional ingredients raisons, dried apricots, chopped hazelnuts, glace cherries, anything you can think of!

Method:

- 1. Line a 20cm square tin (or equivalent) with grease-proof paper with some overhang on the edges.
- 2. Using a bain-marie, melt the dark chocolate, butter and syrup together, making sure to stir it occasionally.
- 3. Bash the biscuits into smaller pieces with a rolling pin, either by adding them into a bag or a bowl.
- 4. Add the melted mixture into a bowl with the crushed biscuits and mix until they are evenly coated.
- 5. Add this point add in any of the optional ingredients and mix too.
- 6. Melt the milk chocolate using a bain-marie too.
- 7. Add the biscuit mixture to the tin and push down until the surface is as flat as possible.
- 8. Pour the melted milk chocolate over the top of the biscuits and spread out evenly.
- 9. Chill the "cake" in the fridge for 1-2 hours until the top chocolate is set.
- 10. Cut into squares and enjoy!






