SWINDON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

There have been many complaints about the conduct about the company engaged to install fibre optic cable across the town. A degree of disruption is inevitable but what we have seen is intolerable. Another contractor has been brought in to assist. Companies require a licence to close roads. The licence requires a contractor to stick to an agreed timescale. When their work is complete, they should also properly reinstate the pavements and highways after they have filled in their trenches. In the past the "making good" has not been very good at all, resulting in yet more potholes and costs for repairs which are paid by us, the public. The County Council is now working to ensure that utility companies are held accountable. Those that overrun their permitted time or otherwise breach the terms of their licence can expect to be penalised.

I participated in the June litter pick. The people that get involved are a lovely, friendly bunch. Sharon and Ruth lead our efforts. It was very hot so we only put in an hour. Actually there wasn't a huge amount of litter about. There have been many sports teams, both senior and junior, training in the park. It was brilliant to see that they had left virtually no rubbish behind!



Here are this month's crew. After the pick Barry kindly invited us to his for a very welcome soft drink.

The next litter pick will start at the Cross Hands at 10:30am on 30th July starting at the Cross Hands. We hope to see more of our folk from south of the Tewkesbury

Road. Come and meet some nice people!



In walking round the area it is clear that the burgeoning vegetation is now taking over many of our footpaths. We need to be careful not to disturb nesting birds at this time of year. That aside, we should all do what we can to ensure that people can walk in safety and not be forced into the road.

Building at Manor Farm has been moving rapidly forward.

The Parish Council continues to monitor the planning applications for Swindon Farm and Home Farm and to engage with the planners as appropriate.



The proposed revised electoral arrangements that will see the parish split into two wards also contained population projections. The ward (which is bigger than the parish) is expected to go from 3811 residents to 5196 in 2028, an increase in population of 36%. That is a measure of the effect the coming housing developments will have.

The Parish Council has succeeded in getting a grant towards the purchase of the Village Hall car park from the Borough Council. This will secure the car park for the foreseeable future. We still have all the legal formalities to complete.

The Sundial Mosaic in the park is receiving some TLC, in particular from Barry and Julia. Careful weeding has been done and the mosaics are being restored. In the longer term we will try to find a way to make the installation more robust.



Plans are being discussed to include a bus lane along the Tewkesbury Road as part of the M5 Junction 10 changes. No doubt there will be a public consultation on this at some point.

We have had another tree fall in the Amenity Area close to the bridge over the stream on Manor Road. An arborist has taken a look and will be providing advice. I will then complete the planning application to get the required tree works done. By the way, do you know the difference between an arboriculturalist, an arborist and a tree surgeon? I didn't. The first two terms are interchangeable; they are titles for people who are experts in tree management. A tree surgeon is the guy who actually wields the chainsaw, i.e. the dangerous bit!

Ian Brown, our long standing volunteer Allotments Manager, is standing down. Ian has done a tremendous job collecting allotment rents and maintaining the allotments. Because of Ian's diligence very little effort and expense has been required of the Parish Council. A massive thank you to you Ian. Chas Pearce will take over the role.

Do you have a noisy suitcase?

Did you know holidaymakers are being banned from wheeling their suitcases across cobbled streets in parts of Europe because of the noise and environmental damage? A fully packed suitcase might weigh 3-4 stones and you realise how important those castor wheels are.

There is another individual who has been moving something of a very similar weight around the world on just a single castor wheel in his travels for the last few decades. His name is Arthur Blessitt, and he carries a cross over countries and continents and has now done so around the whole earth. It is a fitting surname for a devout Christian who feels he was asked by God to expand his fairly modest trips carrying his cross locally in America, to embrace cross-carrying around the world.

On his website, Arthur writes: "This is the 56th year of me carrying the cross around the world in every nation. 1968-2023. The Guinness World Record for the longest walk/pilgrimage. Over 43,340 miles (69,748 km) in 324 countries, island groups and territories. 86 million steps and over 19 billion pounds of total weight carried. Sharing Jesus, the cross and the gospel message. My wife Denise has driven in front with supplies and has been with me in 294 countries. We are just pilgrims, donkeys lifting up the cross and Jesus. God bless you."

If, like me, you are someone who struggles to get their shopping trolley to go in the right direction at Sainsbury's, this is astonishing stuff. In his early days, I think Arthur wore out the base of several crosses (one of which weighed 8 ½ stones) before hitting on the bright idea of the castor wheel offering vastly easier transportation and fewer jolts on uneven ground.

He is best seen in action meeting people with the cross on his shoulder. On YouTube, you might like to have a look at 'The Cross, The Arthur Blessitt Story, posted by Arthur and Denise Blessitt'. This is an approach to faith-sharing very far from the televangelists of the 1980s and 1990s, at work. You see a humble, modest man coming




alongside strangers, sharing what Jesus has done for him and that they are loved beyond measure by a caring God. The genial goodness of the man can leave a lump in the throat!

Arthur goes on to emphasise the impact of cross-carrying. "The physical act of carrying a cross causes a sensation – people remember where and when it was that they saw you, even if they did not speak to you." He has been arrested 24 times and, ironically, he is most likely to be detained in his own country, the United States, rather than anywhere else. He adds: "At a McDonald's, at Yellowknife, N.W. Territories, while we ate, the manager ran out front, grabbed my cross and rushed to the garbage container to throw it away as trash! July 3, 2012. No happy meal if you brought your cross ". In Europe, while Holland had the best roads, it was there that hostility was at its height.

If you're having trouble with a suitcase this summer, spare a thought for Arthur Blessitt, an amazing man who has changed countless lives.

In May, Peter Petrie came to give us a talk on how to build a Medieval Cathedral. However, he didn't really, because the building that is now Gloucester Cathedral was not built as such. What they were building back then, not long after the Normans had turned up, was an Abbey Church. It was built for the Benedictines who were a closed order. It was not until Henry VIII's spat with the Pope in the mid sixteenth century that it became a Cathedral. Henry was then in the process of knocking down or repurposing all the abbeys, but because King Edward II was buried there he wasn't going to knock down the Abbey Church. He thought it would be bad precedent to knock down a church with a king in it. So it was then that the diocese of Gloucester was created and the old abbey became a cathedral. Until then we had all been part of the diocese of Worcester. It always seems strange to think that one of our more useless kings, Edward II, well after his death, still managed to save the fantastic building that is Gloucester. Anyway we did learn much about how to build a magnificent church. One thing that did surprise me was that they did not use scaffolding. The pillars and wall were so thick or broad that they were their own scaffolding. If you were building a pillar you would lay down a large circle of proper faced stone. Then you would fill the middle with rubble and you could stand on the rubble while you built the next few courses of stone before more rubble went in. Steadily the pillar rose to full height. Now, you did need some pretty good ladders and some very good hoists to get the stuff higher and higher but no scaffolding. The walls were built in a similar fashion.

On to July. I'm afraid it is me giving the talk on 'The History of Brockhampton'. That is to say on our Brockhampton, not the one up in the Cotswolds. The talk also includes quite a bit about Southam, Bishops Cleeve and even Elmstone Hardwick. Each year those who do the Village Walk, stroll along Lowdilow Lane in Elmstone Hardwick. If you do take the walk you will have heard the origins of that name but non-walkers can catch up by coming to the talk.

Jerk Marinade

Ingredients:

1 tbsp ground allspice

1 tbsp black pepper

½ tbsp muscovado sugar

2 tbsp runny honey

½ -1 tbsp Olive oil

2 finely chopped spring onions

½ tbsp parsley dried or fresh (chopped)


½ tbsp coriander dried or fresh (chopped)

Lime juice

1 tbsp chili flakes - I normally add 1 ½ for extra spice

1 garlic clove - I try to use the biggest I can find

3cm ginger or dried equivalent (3/4 tbsp?)



I normally add it to chicken or mushrooms, but I imagine would be nice on tofu or maybe even halloumi – will definitely be trying this.

I like to serve with oily, garlic, chili and salt spaghetti but would work with anything, rice and peas, chips or even as a salad topping.




Method

1. Mix all the ingredients together in an oven proof dish except the lime juice together,

start with less olive oil and see how dry the mixture is.

- 2. Mix your chosen food into the mixture and cook. My chicken is normally cooked in 25-30 minutes.
- 3. Once on your plate drizzle with some lime juice and enjoy!
